Of all the statues Antoni Gaudí, the architect and engineer of Sagrada Família in Barcelona, designed, his favorite was the young, teenage Jesus working at the carpenter's bench. Gaudí loved this because it was the preexisting Word, now become flesh, continuing creation. Those words from Genesis 2:15, "Work the earth and take care of it," was a mandate given to humanity to take the raw material of creation and become collaborators and co-creators, continuing and developing what is. Gaudí believed Sagrada Família was just this, enhancing creation, sharing in God's flamboyant, extravagant imagination and design.

I was recently asked to bless an office space and factory, a simple rite of a blessing prayer and sprinkling holy water. We have examples of this collaboration wherever we look, antibiotics (I was on a course for a few weeks recently) their amazing power to overcome infection, the magic of air travel, technology, the internet, modern medicine, are a few examples of human beings taking the basics of creation and running with it. But what about cooking a meal, germinating seeds for this year's vegetable garden, planting daffodil and tulip bulbs, making marmalade, music, pottery, painting? Have you ever thought of the joy this gives God observing us working side-byside with Her/Him on the assembly line of creation?

This pleasure we give God using our gifts, imagination and time enhancing our world and those around us is prayer. On my daily walk, especially now that Spring

has sprung, I find myself pointing out to God the beauty of nature around me, as the Celts would say, enjoying nature and creation for God. This too is collaboration imitating that Divine tradition we find in Genesis when, after each day's creation, God saw what had become and named it "Good." This proclaiming "goodness" on everything is a blessing just as powerful as the sprinkling of holy water.

There is a lovely tradition of blessing our homes with Easter water so, as we step into May month, still abounding in Alleluias, let us imagine ourselves as cocreators sprinkling blessings left, right and center, seeing goodness everywhere, turning, even the most ordinary, into God's pleasure and prayer.
