

Letting go

Recently, I administered the Last Rites to an elderly man, Peter, who had been a Redemptorist before being happily married for over 40 years. He and his wife had been committed to Habitat for Humanity in South America, as well as many local projects of service and caring. I have known Peter for 25 years and although he was not conscious when I visited, I felt he was aware of my presence. I spoke to him of his wife who had died last year, as well as musing that, after all these years, the Redemptorist in him had never died. Peter (and I) had been profoundly influenced by St. Alphonsus de Liguori, the founder of the Redemptorists, who insisted the sole purpose of the Congregation was, through preaching, ministry and especially confession, to liberate people, to set them free.

This reminds me of a reflection written by the Benedictine, Fr. Demetrius Dunn, who suggests that the question asked of us at Final Judgement is, "Did you set my people free, or like Pharaoh, did you hold them bound?"

"Setting free" has many dimensions. On a walk, I met a couple who shared that their youngest had just passed his driver's test and, now that the family nest was beginning to empty, how hard it was to let go not only of their children but also of the identity that had been their life to this point. Or, another couple who discerned that their work and environment were no longer life-giving, so let both go for a new call and journey.

This "letting go" can apply to children, family, friends as well as ourselves, it often seems to involve struggle, pain and a dying in order to attain the freedom on the other side of letting go. As with life, a heathy spirituality needs to begin with ourselves, I don't think we can fully let people go until we have been let go ourselves.

To be personally liberated requires letting God go in us, letting God be free in us, perhaps a little scary as God, in Jesus, has the sole aim of setting us free so we can become who we were created to be. It is a journey, God never stops working in and on us until we are free and have life in abundance.

Peter experienced that total freedom the next morning when he crossed the Jordan into eternity. I'm wondering if, for the month of October, we should all become Redemptorists and reflect on Demetrius' question, "Did you set my people free?"
